Mortar for Mission: keep our legacy intact for others

A campaign is underway to restore our beautiful but aging church. We all can help.

An important new element of Caldwell's Centennial celebration is in the works - one that will help pave the way for our church's future.

In honor of all of those who helped build the church campus, a capital fund-raising campaign named *Mortar for Mission* has been organized to invite all Caldwell members to contribute to campus repairs.

"We owe a debt to those at Caldwell who came before us and built this campus," said Centennial Committee Chair **Beth Van Gorp**. "We inherited these buildings debt-free. They have enabled Caldwell to do ministry in a far larger way than we could have otherwise, providing shelter, education, worship and hospitality on literally a 24x7x365 basis. Caldwell is first and foremost a missional church. We seek to serve

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others before ourselves. We're calling it *Mortar for Mission* to recognize the role our buildings play in our ability to do missions ministry," she said. "The name also signifies the role mortar plays in construction. It's the mortar that holds the bricks together and in place, just like Caldwell does in all of our lives."

After the annual **Discipleship**Campaign in October, which will
gather financial pledges for the operating budget in 2013, the congregation will learn more about the campaign to make overdue repairs to the campus. The **Buildings and**Grounds Committee has identified 22 major repair projects and carefully researched repair costs.

"The good news is that our buildings are in sound shape," said **Tom Bohr**, chairman of Buildings and Grounds. "Through the annual budget and the hard work, ingenuity and devotion of people like the late **Jimmy Todd**, we have made significant repairs over the last 5 years equaling about \$150,000 in value."

"However," Tom continued, "we have a list of projects that need attention now. It's just good stewardship of what we've been given. It also ensures we can continue to be the body of Christ to those less fortunate than many of us."

The projects will address repairs to the buildings as well as to our cherished stained-glass windows, which desperately need attention before they are beyond repair.

One of the first projects, funded by the Session, will be plaster repairs and new paint for the sanctuary. To date, a group of Caldwell leaders has

already pledged \$80,000 over the next three years for the campaign. All congregation members will be invited to participate beginning in November.

"We want to ensure that members are able to meet their first obligation to Caldwell, which is their annual pledge for 2013," said **Rev. John Cleghorn**. "So we will be back in touch with everyone about this after the Discipleship Campaign ends October 28."

Pastor's Message

A year ago, when we mapped out the various activities of our Centennial year, the **Centennial Committee**, the **Session** and I agreed that these months of September through December would be a good time for thinking, praying and discernment about what comes next for Caldwell.

Our Centennial began with seven months of looking back and learning more about the 100-year history of the church, trials and triumphs included. Next, we spent the summer looking at some current issues facing society and the church, including immigration and economic apartheid. It seemed only appropriate that we would then ask: Where might our Lord be leading Caldwell in its second century?

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We didn't know then how appropriate that question would turn out to be. Now, in the providence of God, we are being given more and more to think and pray about relative to 2013 and beyond.

A few weeks ago, **Rev. Veronica Rogers** informed us that she feels
called to restructure her life to spend
more time with family. Veronica's
season as a minister among us has
been one of blessings too numerous
to count. I join you all in being
grateful that she will continue to
minister here until early December.
In the meantime, the Session will
begin considering the church's needs
and the best and highest callings for
where we might focus a second pastoral role at Caldwell.

But, as significant as that set of decisions is, it seems that is not all that we being called to consider. Last week, the **Salvation Army**, our partners in **Caldwell House**, informed me of their decision to wind down the operations of Caldwell House by the time our current funding ends in March 2013. While we had discussed extending our partnership until at least December 2014, changes in federal and local funding parameters have made it much harder to raise money for transitional shelters such as Caldwell House.

This news hits many of us almost as hard as Veronica's announcement. Since its unexpected creation from scratch in August 2010, Caldwell House has become a central ministry that enables us to walk with women in need.

We have formed lasting relationships with current and past residents, whom we have seen successfully get their lives back on track and move into independent housing. We helped create a network of supporters, including businesses, churches and other volunteer groups. Together

these partners have provided tens of thousands of individual night stays at Caldwell House along with hundreds of meals, dozens of self-improvement class hours, devotions and other activities. These activities will continue through March 2013, so it's important that we keep that vital ministry strong until then.

As you know, Caldwell is also conducting a search for a new Music Director, someone who will play a key role in helping shape our worship and contributing to the staff and vision for the church. To add one more set of considerations, major funding challenges have postponed the Charlotte Bilingual Preschool's ability to open classes at Caldwell this fall. Caldwell had applied for a \$360,000 grant from the denomination to up-fit the **Price Building** for the preschool. We did not get the grant. We remain committed to the preschool, we cannot be certain what the future holds for our partnership as it relates to our campus.

The **Book of Proverbs** tells is that "for everything there is a season," as Veronica cited in her recent letter to the congregation about her decision.

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Affirmations offers a way forward for Christianity

Adult Sunday school explores 12 weeks of *The Phoenix Affirmations*

What lays ahead in terms of the future of Christianity will be the focus of the next several months of Adult Sunday school leading up to Advent as the class explores *The Phoenix Affirmations*.

The premise of the Affirmations is a set of 12 principles written by clergy and laypeople in Phoenix, Arizona in 2006 that outline a potential future for progressive Christianity. The class at Caldwell will devote one Sunday to each of those principles.


The first Affirmation: Walking fully in the Path of Jesus without denying the legitimacy of other paths that God may provide for humanity.

"I think it's an exciting study for us here at Caldwell because it's about getting to the roots of our faith as well as looking forward to where Christianity can take us or is going," said **Helen Hull**, moderator of the course.

Hull said the Affirmations are "about providing and envisioning a way forward for Christianity - and for each of us on our faith journey."

In the introductory session to the set the table for the Affirmations, each of the 21 attendees took a moment to talk about their own new beginnings, be it a moment of enlightenment or some other life event of significance and what helped to support them through the transformation.

"The Phoenix Affirmations themselves are a sort of support for the Christian faith and those practicing Christianity today, and a new direction or a new beginning, in that they re-visit, revise, and re-affirm some tenets of the Christian faith," said Helen.

Torn Between Two Loves

Each day we are faced with multiple decisions. Some decisions are easy because the advantage of one plan of action clearly outweighs the other. But what do we do when we are faced with two equally compelling choices?

E. B. White, (American writer and author of the children's book, <u>Charlotte's Web</u>) observed this dilemma. "I arise in the morning torn between a desire to improve the world and a desire to enjoy

the world. This makes it hard to plan the day." Often we are faced with times in our lives when we must choose one or the other—to make a difference or to just have fun. Then there are times when we find that can do both.

I am blessed to serve in an environment which gives me the opportunity to work with others to improve conditions and simultaneously, to enjoy the world which God created. I am fortunate to be a part of a supportive and caring team with John Cleghorn and Leslie Gipple. Each week, parishioners and affiliates from our various church ministries come by to share their talents and stories or to seek spiritual direction. And then there is our jubilant Sunday worship service, lifting my spirits and speaking to my heart in this place of reverence and honor to God.

In our lives, we often put off doing the things that bring us fulfillment for a later time. I can go on that trip to Jerusalem --- later. (Why didn't someone tell me that my arthritis would prevent me from climbing those hills?) I can hold my granddaughter on my lap --- later. (How did she get to be 16 years old already?) I can visit my cousin --- later. (Doesn't everyone live to be 102?) If we examine our thoughts throughout the day, they are generally about our yesterdays or our tomorrows. Someone coined the expression, "the immediacy of now" to speak to the importance of living in present moment.

There is nothing like having another birthday to put us in touch with the immediacy of now. A birthday can create space for meditation and assessment of one's life. Each May, my spiritual sister and I traditionally celebrate our birthdays. However, this past celebration was very different. She had received a life-altering health diagnosis. We have always shared our ministries, our values and our desires, our joys and concerns as we journeyed on parallel paths. However, our conversations moved to an even deeper level in light of her diagnosis. We were suddenly faced with a true immediacy. We are grateful for God's call on our lives; yet lately, we have been prayerfully asking God's this question, "What would you have us to do - now?"

Recently, the demand on my availability to my biological family has increased. My sister and I are now the youngsters who are expected to provide care and make decisions for our cousins who are in their 80's and beyond. My children and grandchildren live in Atlanta and Washington, DC. My youngest son, who lives in Seattle, Washington, has been diagnosed with a serious chronic illness.

The ministry of this vibrant church is dynamic and growing, one that will require additional time and energy. And so I found myself torn between the two loves - the love of my Caldwell family and the love of my family of origin. As I engaged in a time of discernment, I came to the realization that it really isn't *either-or* but *both-and*. This Caldwell family has become as entrenched in my life as my other family. But because of this present immediacy, it appears that my next year will be one of traveling and care giving as need dictates.

So I am no longer <u>torn</u> between two loves, for I am blessed by the choice of being able to love each concurrently. Caldwell Family, thanks for the love, encouragement, and understanding that you have shown me in this difficult decision. *And now faith, hope and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love*. 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Work with Latinos to continue; impact on preschool

Temporary closure of Bilingual Preschool does not mean outreach to Latino community will stop

The school year has begun for our children, parents, and teachers at the **Bilingual Preschool**. A new classroom was added to the main site at **Third Presbyterian Church**, which is licensed by the State of North Carolina, and some families familiar to us at Caldwell are among those who will be at the Central Avenue location this school year.

Due to funding constraints, the Caldwell site of the Bilingual Preschool will not be open this semester. The decision was a difficult one, but the board of the Preschool thought it was better to open later than to open in September and perhaps be forced to close. We remain hopeful the grant requests now outstanding will be enough to open our Caldwell site no later than January 2013.

In the meantime, outreach to our Latino neighbors will continue to be a focus of Caldwell's mission plans. The **Latino Ministry Committee** has several exciting volunteer and participation opportunities in the works, including continuing our close relationship with the Bilingual Preschool. The parents will come to Caldwell for their English as a Second Language classes and some of their parenting classes. Because they do not have a strong volunteer base at the Central Avenue location, Caldwell volunteers are needed there to read to the children and serve as classroom "floaters."

Two new opportunities that will further our relationship with the Bilingual Preschool will be introduced this fall. A pilot program is being developed in which Caldwell families and individuals can mentor some of the Preschool families who are particularly at risk. We will start with a "getting to know you" dinner in November. Providing a meal for the teachers once a month at their staff lunches is also a new way for you to get involved.

The Latino Ministry Committee also hopes to further our outreach in the Latino community beyond the Bilingual Preschool. We will celebrate Christmas with our neighbors at a special **Las Posadas** event in December (more about that later), schedule a Justice Forum on Immigration in winter, and organize the 2013 Mission Trip to Guatemala (dates to be announced soon).

Last year 15 Caldwell volunteers demonstrated their Christian love by actively supporting, mentoring and teaching the students, parents and staff of the Charlotte Bilingual Preschool. For the moment the location of our outreach to this under-served population has changed, but the needs of our Latino neighbors have grown. We will continue to be open to however God is calling us to be in relationship with our brother and sisters. 


Troy Bowles and **Leroy Stinson** are always at the ready to set up post-Sunday service refreshments on the front lawn. Weather permitting, of course.
