Union Pres. Seminary: source of Caldwell clergy

New building highlights decades of preparing Presbyterian clergy - including those we know at Caldwell

Tucked behind **Sharon Presbyterian Church** on a wooded tract is a new building whose two wings symbolically represent outstretched arms of welcome to visitors.

Welcome, indeed. It is the new home of **Union Presbyterian Seminary**, where those aspiring to the ministry begin their walk with the church - and a school where a pastor and a half-dozen recent interns have received a call to serve Caldwell.

The three acre Charlotte campus is affiliated with the seminary's 200 -year-old primary location in Richmond, Virginia.

'Union' derives from a union of seminary doctrine between Virginia and North Carolina. The Charlotte school was formed 12 years ago when a group of five presbyteries approached Richmond officials to

request a Charlotte location to serve the needs of area Presbyterian churches.

The new facility was completed in September, 2012 at a cost of nearly \$7 million raised from individuals, presbyteries and churches, but the total includes an endowment to fund maintenance and upkeep.

Inside the two-story structure are four small and three large class-rooms, an 18,000 volume resource library and offices for four full time professors and a small administrative staff. The chapel and other rooms feature stained glass windows once stored on the Richmond campus.

The building can accommodate up to 130 students, but this semester's 78 students is a typical enrollment. Union is a welcoming study environment; classes are open to Methodists, American Baptists and Lutherans.

Pastor's Message

Missional and Transformative:


These are intentional ideas, more than just "churchy sounding" words. They have and will continue to form us. As with so much of our Mission Statement they are aspirational. They have the power to form us as a new expression of the body of Christ in an era when the church at large desperately needs new expression.

As a natural first step, we will spend time deepening our understanding of what they mean. We will do this by sharing some reading and short videos in which church leaders from various circles express what it means, to them at least, to be missional and transformative. These materials will be shared via our website and in handout form for reading. The congregation will divide up into small groups for discussion (the second "D") and shared elaboration. Stav tuned for details on how we will share the information and gather in small groups.

We "kick off" with sermons on Feb. 24 (what it means to be missional), March 3 (what it means for a church to be transformative) and



March 10, when we are privileged to host a visit by **Bruce Reyes-Chow** (above) who recently held the top elected position of our national denomination. Bruce will bring his per-

Also, don't forget that we all have the chance to participate with other Presbyterians from across the country in a national conference here in Charlotte. To be sure, we enter this next phase of life together from a position of abundance – abundance in relationships, ministry opportunities, potential and a sense of adventure in seeking what God has in store for us. As is written in Ephesians 3.20-21.

Common Hope's Vision Team experience is intended to foster encounters that educate, provoke compassion, and challenge complacency. While in Guatemala you will work hard to accomplish real and significant work. However, the work is not

the end goal, but rather part of the experience-an experience that will change your world view and open your heart.

The Common Hope staff seeks to maintain a balance between the needs of the organization and the interests of the volunteers. You will alternate job assignments depending on individual abilities and the work needing to be done. Some of the work can be hard, but there is plenty to do for people who prefer less strenuous tasks

During the trip you will participate in a variety of activities which may include the following: accompanying a social worker on visits to the villages, observing or helping in the classrooms or preschool, constructing a home, teaching a craft, preparing educational materials, landscaping grounds, working in the warehouse, or attending talks by staff members. Common Hope loves to draw on volunteer's special skills and talents as well.

Your experience will not end when you leave Guatemala. Returning home provides Vision Team members with an opportunity to share their experience and what they've learned with friends, family and the Caldwell congregation.

Our mission trips to Guatemala are an integral part of Caldwell's mission and justice ministry and enhance much of the work we are doing locally in our community!

Common Hope's approach works

Zach Thomas shares his experience with Common Hope:

Common Hope focuses on education to help poor children in Guatemala. Does their approach actually work? The Sociology Department of Chicago University compared two sets of children - those affiliated with Common Hope and those who were not. Affiliated children were more likely to graduate from high school, to find jobs that paid more and to live healthier lives.

I wrote *Weaving Common Hope: a Future for Guatemalan Children* to provide a detailed history of the project. The book explains the project's origins and how it grew to help over 11,000 people to break the cycles of poverty. It supports children, their families and public schools in a manner that respects their dignity and self-determination.

The family of a Guatemalan child, sponsored by families in the U.S., receives health care, housing, school supplies, support groups and more depending on the family's needs. Our Vision Teams' experience (which Sally helped administer during our five-years there as long-term volunteers) is lifechanging.

Weaving Common Hope: a Future for Guatemalan Children is available through Common Hope or Amazon or me. Proceeds go to the church.

On Easter Sunday we provided a lily in the sanctuary to honor our past and present members.



Unity is seen as a gift and obligation for the church

I was fortunate to spend two days with fourteen Presbyterians from various regions in the United States and Puerto Rico. We were pastors and laypersons from churches large and small, diverse and homogenous. Our common interest was *The Belhar Confession* and devising a strategy for successful inclusion

into the Presbyterian *Book of Confessions*. The highlight of our meeting was having the opportunity to interact with the authors of the confession by way of Skype. It was 2:30 in the afternoon in Louisville, Kentucky and 9:30 in the evening in two cities of South Africa but the single conversation centered on Unity-Reconciliation-Justice proclaimed in the gospel of Jesus Christ and the Belhar Confession. Next we talked with members of the Reformed Church in America (RCA) who shepherded the confession through the RCA adoption process. The following church vision comes from a portion of the resources RCA has generously offered to share with the PC(USA).

- Imagine a church called by God and empowered by the Holy Spirit to stand where God stands, with the poor and powerless.
- Imagine a church that give voice to the voiceless, exercises power on behalf of the powerless.
- Imagine a church that resists and rejects as contrary to the Gospel and essence of the church any form of separation, enmity and hatred between people and groups
- Imagine a church where baptism and not biology determines a person's status and opportunity of membership in the body of Christ.
- Imagine hurts being healed, the lost being found, the hungry being fed...lives transformed by the love of Jesus Christ.
- Imagine "a thousand churches in million ways doing one thing ...following Christ in mission, in a lost and broken world so loved by God".

That is the church who, following Belhar, confesses "Unity is seen as a gift and obligation for the church... Reconciliation is entrusted to the church by God through both word and deed...Justice and true peace are revealed as the nature of God."

"I Am Presbytery." That was the phrase which guided the 117th Stated Meeting of the **Presbytery of Charlotte**, held Saturday, Feb. 16, at **Cook's Memorial Presbyterian Church** in Charlotte. If you grew up Presbyterian, you have probably heard and read a lot about presbytery meetings over the years.

But if you are relatively new to the denomination, as many of us are, the concept of Presbytery may be a little puzzling...perhaps a bit mysterious. Plus, much of the news coming out of the secular media recently has focused on internal squabbles related to a transition in leadership at our presbytery.

Put simply, a presbytery is the council which serves as the corporate expression of the **Presbyterian Church** (USA) within a certain district. It is composed of all the congregations and teaching elders within that district. The Presbytery of Charlotte is made up of more than 120 churches, with nearly 40,000 members, within a seven-county area of southcentral North Carolina.

And, if you attended the meeting on Feb. 16, you probably felt right at home. In fact, a better slogan for it might have been: "We are Presbytery", because there were a lot of familiar faces there. Pastor **John Cleghorn** is the current Moderator of Council; **Kitty Bohr** is Co-Moderator of the Committee on Ministry; active Elders **Sharon Harmon-Robinson** and **Johnny Johnson** were there as commissioners from our church; past intern **Danny Trapp** was enrolled as a Candidate for Ministry at the meeting; and several other members of our church attended as visitors.

A highlight for everyone was Pastor Cleghorn's council report, which included a video showing some of the many wonderful things that the Presbytery of Charlotte does in our district, such as supporting pastors, organizing presbytery-wide mission initiatives, and funding hospital chaplaincy programs. You can view it on the internet by going to www.youtube.com, and entering "presbytery of charlotte video" on the command line.

What I learned at this meeting is that, while it's true that we face challenges in this time of transition in our denomination, it is also a time for new possibilities. In Isaiah 43:19, the Lord says "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" That passage of Holy Scripture has had special meaning for Caldwell Church during the past five years, and now for the Presbytery of Charlotte as well. As Pastor Cleghorn said to those in attendance, "This is your presbytery. Get involved, find a role to play."

What an exciting time it is for us to be disciples of Jesus the Christ! Amen.

Interns find a well-rounded experience at Caldwell

The road to ministry can be a winding one, but for a few **Union Presbyterian Seminary** students, that road led them straight to Caldwell.

An internship is a calling almost totally initiated by the student. According to former Caldwell intern **Lisa McLennan**, "Students make the outreach" to churches in hopes of finding a church that will let them practice areas the student needs to strengthen. In Lisa's case, she wanted to center on being able to preach, taking on mission activities and working with the session. She found all three at Caldwell. "I knew Caldwell had the shelter, and I knew John (Cleghorn) would let people preach," she said. "I asked him if you would let me practice these things." Lisa got her marching orders right away: 'We need to feed these ladies (at the shelter)', said John. To Lisa, a registered dietician who had the background to help feed the women, it meant "the Holy Spirit stepped in." Other interns (next page) provide similar witness.

That Caldwell allows interns a well-rounded experience is great. Seminary Dean **Tom Currie** said "We are thrilled to have a partnership with Caldwell. It has worked well for our students."

Until the construction of the new building, classes were held on the Presbyterian-related Queens University campus in Charlotte. Union the second oldest Presbyterian seminary in the U.S. - takes a unique approach to seminary education.

Caldwell's interns are no different than the rest of the student body - working adults well on in their careers but who experienced a call to ministry. Classes are held largely on weekends or evenings as a matter of convenience for working adults, and the school attracts scholars from a wide area. Commuters come from as far as Greenville, South Carolina or Atlanta for weekend courses.

Seminary is no different than other colleges in that Union students start with basic courses ("HST101 - History of Christianity") and work their way up to advanced classes ("BIB221 - New Testament 1").

The connection to Caldwell runs deep at Union. In addition to Pastor John Cleghorn, Union has supplied a steady stream of interns eager for a broad church experience (see companion story above). In recent years, Caldwell has been a springboard to the ministry for Pastor Veronica Rogers, Danny Trapp (who graduates in April from Union), Will Davis, Phanta Lansden, Lisa McLennan and Liz Wagner.







Resource rooms are well-lit, spacious and conducive to study (some pastors write sermons in the rooms). A model of a 6 foot Celtic cross that will be placed in front of the building. Honestly, I have spent most of my life in a small white congregation and, my time at Caldwell allowed me to experience worship in a different format which was enriching to my life, and informative. Caldwell is much more of a celebratory atmosphere, with enthusiasm. It's a contagious enthusiasm for our love for God. and it allowed me to experience worship in a completely different atmosphere. I got to walk with people and get to know them in different ways. God's children are verv diverse, and I got to *experience* that much more intensely at Caldwell. Caldwell looks like the whole world and at 11:00 it's not so segregated. It gave me a chance to practice things I need to practice. The congregation nurtured me and gave me feedback on what I needed to improve and what I was doing well. Lisa McLennan



When you become an intern, the church you go to has needs specific to that church, and interns have specific needs. I needed experience in worship leadership. I had never led a service of worship. That is what Caldwell has enabled me to do. My second Sunday here, I did everything but the sermon. For me, that's incredible to have that opportunity. Some churches don't make an opportunity to do that. To be able to lead an entire service was what I needed. I had never preached a sermon to an entire congregation. Some churches don't give interns an opportunity to preach, and here I've had four sermons. The support of this congregation gives you energy. When you look out at the congregation, you can feel and see the support in their faces and demeanor. They want you there. It's like 'we're here for you. We'll help you.' Will Davis



What is unique about Caldwell is that the congregation is extremely. affirming, loving, supportive and extremely genuine. It just blows my mind and enriches my heart,. When I came in as a intern, I didn't know many people, but it has been an awesome experiences because of the richness of the congregation and the people.
